Each school year, before any buggies will be allowed to practice on the streets or sidewalks surrounding CMU, a set of safety regulations must be ratified. Subsequent to ratification no buggy will be allowed to practice until it has passed an inspection by the Safety Chairman.

Push practices will be held Sunday through Thursday from midnight to 7 a.m. on Tech and Frew streets. The Safety Chairman will be present from 12:00 to 12:30 to organize traffic control, and enforce safety regulations.

Any buggy used in race or practice must be equipped with a self resetting brake system. The brake test consists of two parts, the first is the capability test which determines brake safety for a free-rolling buggy, the second is a check test to see if brakes are functioning properly at free rolls, push practices and on race day. The capability test is run between Baker and Doherty halls, once a semester. The buggy must attain a speed of 15 mph then stop in 40 feet, in a relatively straight line. The check test is run in front of the gym before all free roll practices and after every race. The buggy is dropped from a dead stop and allowed to roll 30 feet, then must stop in 15 feet. The driver must release the brake and stop again.



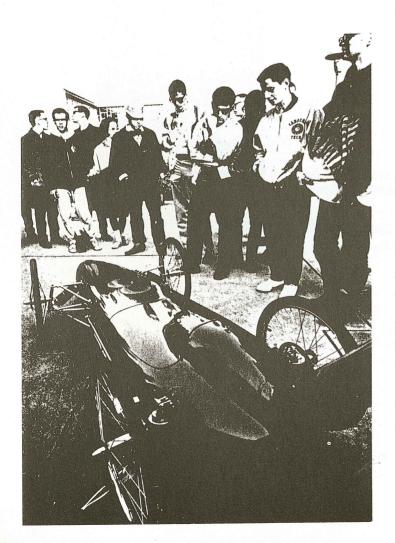
We can dance, we can dance, everybody look at your hands

- 1) Lighting A light shall be attached to the push bar during dark or twilight hours.
- 2) Vision The driver must be able to see clearly 45 degrees to each side, 25 feet in front of her (him) and the horizon.
- 3) Harnesses The driver must wear a harness at all times.
- 4) Head Protection The driver must wear a head cover at all times.
- 5) Eye Protection Windscreens must be shatter proof, if a buggy has no windscreen adequate eye protection will be worn.
- 6) Driver's Cage Buggies shall be designed that there is no danger to the driver if the buggy were to hit a horizontal bar at any height at 15 mph.
- 7) Roll Protection Buggies shall be designed that there is no danger in case of roll or flip-over.
- 8) Equipment Moving parts (wheels, steering) shall have lock nuts, cotter pins or snap rings.

Sweepstakes officially begins on Thursday with the Buggy Design Competition. It is here that the public and the competition get a close-up look at some of the buggies that will be racing during the following two days. The buggies will be on display in the main gymnasium all day Thursday, one of the few times the public can see buggies at a standstill.

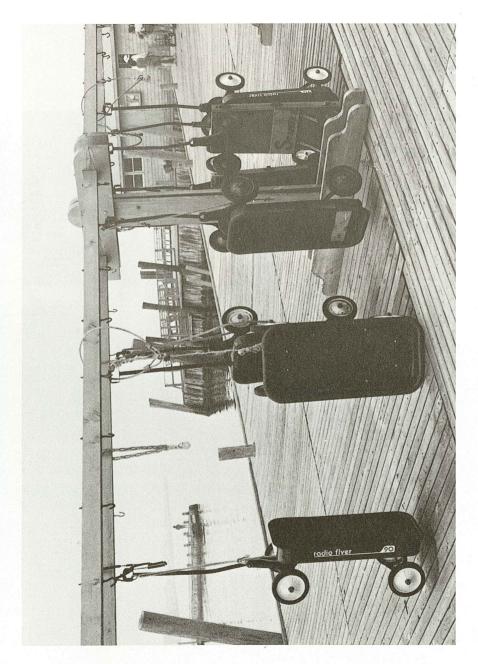
Throughout Thursday, each organization will present it's entry to a panel of judges from various CMU departments. These judges then award the buggies a score based on overall engineering, design and craftsmanship and appearance. The engineering category includes an evaluation of the steering, braking and suspension systems, the aerodynamics of the chassis and the driver's occupancy and safety.

Ideally the buggy that finishes first in the Design Competition will also place high in the race. The Trophies will be presented to the top three winners at the Awards Ceremony on Saturday evening.

Last year the brothers of Pi Lambda Phi proved that we could run circles around the competition. this year we are going to beat them in a straight line. Joining the three-wheeled LEGEND will be an old favorite, FALCON. We've got a sturdy team of pushers this year, consisting of seasoned veterans and young blood. Combine them with our stable of well-trained drivers and our dedicated group of mechanics, and our dark horse candidate has a greater-than-ever chance of being one of the first buggies across the finish line.



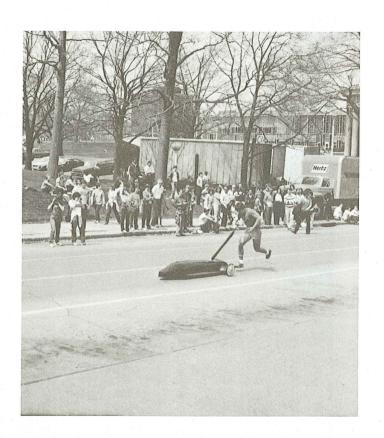


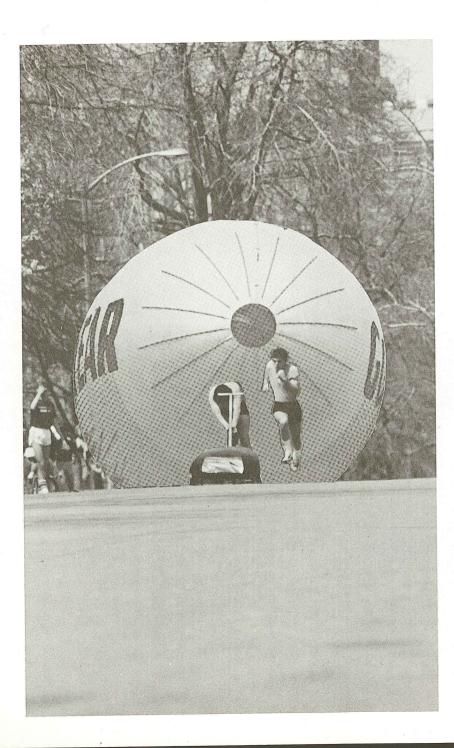


"Buggies in Bondage"

First there was Streak and its Shadow.

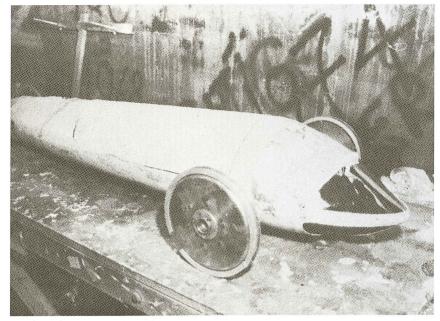
Now there is Stiletto and its Silhouette.



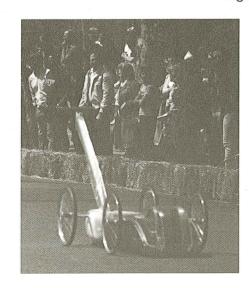

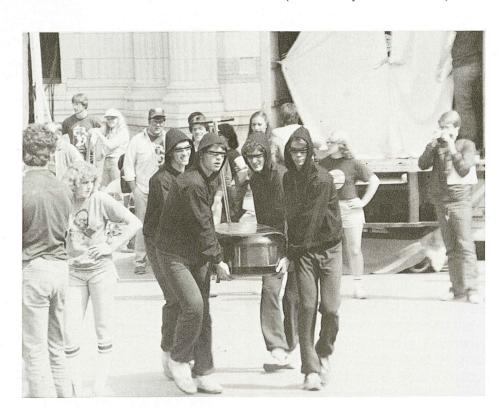

Organizations at CMU have been building and racing buggies since 1920. In the more than 60 years of the Sweepstakes competition buggy designs have gone from the first soap box style bodies through outlandish bodies that sported the shapes of fish and even grasshoppers and finally on to the sleek aerodynamic designs of today.

Originally buggies were built to carry two people, a mechanic (today's pushers) and a driver, and though none of the buggies of the time had brakes it was required that they weigh at least seventy-five pounds.

The buggies of the present carry only one person and trimming the weight of the machines has become a crucial factor in design along with the ability of each to pass a battery of brake tests that insure the safety of the drivers.

Where once the Sweepstakes competition was clearly divided into the design category and the race, and it was possible for a winner of the design category to not even enter the race, today's competition is built around a philosophy that believes a buggy must not only compete in the race unchanged from the way it was when judged. A buggy must always be designed to win the race.

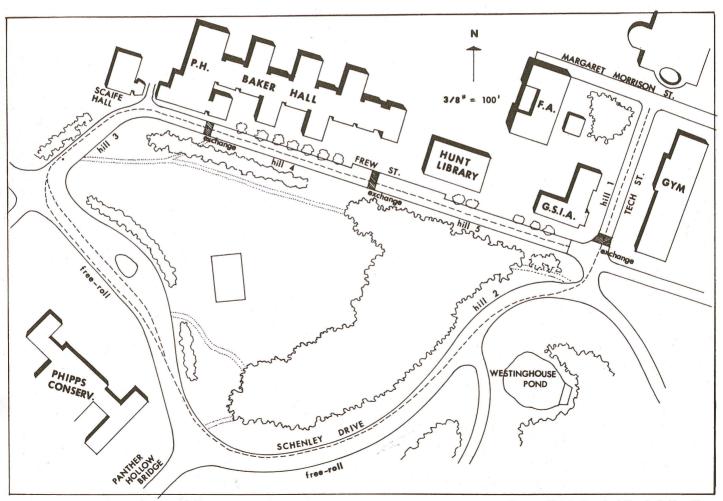
